Message From the Principal

n behalf of the Board of Governors, Members of staff and students I extend warmest greetings and congratulations to the Dinthill Technical High School Alumni Association, Jamaica on this your significant milestone of celebrating your third anniversary banquet. You truly embody the School's Motto: Facta Non Verba", "Deeds not Words".

It is with a sense of immense mixed emotion that I pen this report. As a school, we have experienced the joys of victories and triumphs as well as tragedies during the 2015-2017 and growth academic years. The year 2015-2016 saw the school body being plunged into mourning resulting from the deaths of Mr. Everton Samuda and Mrs. Bridget Fearon Douglas both teachers, Miss Lorraine McTaggart a member of the ancillary staff and Shemar Mitchell a grade eleven student. Additionally, for medical reasons, I was on a leave of absence from December 2016 to April 2017. However, the operation of the school was ably lead by Mrs. Monica White who acted as Principal.

The happiness, of which I spoke earlier, began with the medical contingent of doctors, chiropractors as well as dentists from the Florida Chapter of the DTHS Alumni Association, who graciously flew to Jamaica and provided free medical services as well as refreshment to approximately 800 students. Thus, the school year began on time with us adhering to the mandates from the Ministry of Education of no school fee being charged to the parents instead they were asked to voluntarily make a monetary contribution. This was limited in scope and saw us operating the first term of school with financial constraints.

Despite the challenges our students continue to excel tremendously. In the 2016 Food and Nutrition CAPE Examinations we were awarded first, second and third place in Jamaica. This year eleven of our students, the largest number to date was honored for their outstanding performance in their CSEC/CAPE. We also copped the award for top student in the Technical Vocational Area. This award was given to Julienne Gonzales who received 9 ones, among those were three distinctions for English Language, Mathematics and Food and Nutrition.


